Why is using the proper pronoun case important for clear communication?</p> <p>Effective communicators utilize their knowledge of standard English grammar and usage to clearly communicate their thoughts and ideas.</p> <p><u>Student Friendly Objectives</u></p> <p><i>Knowledge Targets</i></p> <p>Students must know pronouns refer to or replace nouns in a sentence. Students must know that a pronoun in the subjective case is used as the subject of the sentence. Students must identify must know that a pronoun in the objective case is used as the object of verbs or prepositions within a sentence. Students must identify possessive case pronouns as those which show and express ownership or relationship (e.g., Sonia baked her famous pie). Students must match the type of pronoun to the noun it is replacing (e.g., antecedent). Students must use the correct pronoun case when writing.</p> <p><i>Reasoning Targets</i></p> <p>I know pronouns refer to or replace nouns in a sentence. I can identify pronouns in the subjective case. I can identify pronouns in the objective case. I can identify possessive case pronouns as those which show and express ownership or relationship. I can match the type of pronoun to the noun it is replacing.</p>
