Ouestions to Focus Learning  Why is it important to know the difference between denotation and connotation when working with words? How does the use of denotative and connotative meaning assist in communicating ideas?  Effective communicators understand and use figurative language, nuances in word meanings, and word relationships to clarify and express meaning.  Student Friendly Objectives  Knowledge Targets  Students must know that connotation refers to the ideas and feelings associated with the meaning of a word when someone hears or reads the word.  Students must know that a word can have a positive, negative, or neutral connotation (e.g., weak has a negative connotation when it is referring to a lack of strength in character).  Students must know that denotation refers to the literal or dictionary meaning of a word.  Students must know that words may have similar meanings, but their connotative meanings may be very different (e.g., polite vs. diplomatic).  Students must understand that the connotative meanings of words can influence an audience's emotions.
