<p>R.CCR.6 Assess how point of view or purpose shapes the content and style of a text.</p>	<p><u>Questions to Focus Learning</u></p> <p>How does the author's distinction of his or her own position from that of others affect the style or content of the text?</p> <p>Readers' critical analysis of an author's point of view and purpose helps them to assess the author's credibility as a source of information.</p> <p><u>Student Friendly Objectives</u></p> <p><i>Knowledge Targets</i></p> <p>I know authors write from a unique perspective or point of view (which is distinguished from other points of view presented).</p> <p>I know point of view can be analyzed by determining the author's relationship to the topic or event in the text.</p> <p>I know the objectivity of a text can be influenced by an author's purpose and/or personal bias.</p> <p>I know authors structure their text to best achieve their purpose in writing (e.g., compare/contrast, cause/effect, sequence, description, problem/solution).</p> <p>I know authors may acknowledge other positions or viewpoints to reinforce (strengthen) their own.</p> <p>I know authors may include other viewpoints/positions to lend credibility to their overall understanding of the topic.</p> <p>I know authors may assert themselves as experts or trustworthy sources (but that doesn't make it so).</p> <p><i>Reasoning Targets</i></p> <p>I can analyze the author's relationship to the topic or central idea in the text.</p> <p>I can determine the point of view from which the author has written.</p> <p>I can determine the author's purpose for writing a text.</p> <p>I can recognize bias in an author's presentation of information.</p> <p>I can contrast the author's point of view with others presented in the text.</p> <p>I can explain how authors use different positions or viewpoints to advance their purpose.</p> <p>I can assess the author's reliability as a source of information.</p>
