<p>R.CCR.4 Interpret words and phrases as they are used in a text, including determining technical, connotative, and figurative meanings, and analyze how specific word choices shape meaning or tone.</p>	<p><u>Questions to Focus Learning</u> How does understanding the structure of our language and word use help strengthen comprehension?</p> <p>Good readers use specific words and phrases to help determine the overall meaning or tone of the text.</p> <p><u>Student Friendly Objectives</u> <i>Knowledge Targets</i></p> <p>I can identify figurative language such as similes, metaphors and personification in text. I know words have connotations (associations or secondary meanings) as well as denotations (the dictionary definition of a word) (e.g., stingy, scrimping, economical, unwasteful, thrifty). I understand that technical words and phrases must be used to help clarify processes and procedures. I understand every text has a tone, and that an author's choice of words and phrases impact the tone of the text. I know tone is the author's attitude toward the topic conveyed through words and phrases.</p> <p><i>Reasoning Targets</i></p> <p>I can determine how the author's use of words and phrases deepens the reader's understanding of the content. I can explain how the author's use of figurative language further illustrates/expands the meaning or message of text. I can explain how the author's use of connotative meanings conveys the author's stance/tone within a text. I can explain how an author's use of technical language helps the reader to understand specific processes and procedures in technical text.</p> <p><u>Vocabulary</u></p> <p>associations connotation denotation figurative language stance tone</p>
