<u>I, the basket: Writing a first-person story as an inanimate object</u> - In this interdisciplinary lesson for grade seven, students explore the first-person point of view through children's literature and images of Nepal. Students exhibit their understanding of first-person narrative by writing a children's story from the perspective of an inanimate object. <u>Creative writing through wordless picture books</u> - In this ReadWriteThink lesson, students are exposed to wordless picture books and begin developing story lines orally and in writing.

Exploring author's voice using Jane Addams Award-winning books - In this lesson, students explore author's voice and style using Jane Addams Award-winning books.

<u>Fairy tale autobiographies</u> - In this lesson from ReadWriteThink, students will work in groups to read and analyze fairy tales, brainstorm for events in their lives that could be changed into fairy tales, and develop setting, characters, and plot for their fairy tale.
