<p>R.CCR.6 Assess how point of view or purpose shapes the content and style of a text.</p>	<p><u>Questions to Focus Learning</u></p> <p>How does point of view affect the reader’s thoughts about characters and events in a text?</p> <p>Using multiple points of view impacts the reader's interaction with the elements of the story, as well as the writer's flexibility to create a complex story.</p> <p><u>Student Friendly Objectives</u></p> <p><i>Knowledge Targets</i></p> <p>I know characters in a story have different perspectives. I know one way authors control the information relayed to readers is by including or excluding points of view. I know authors may switch the point of view to offer the reader a different perspective on characters or events. I know authors offer more than one point of view in order to explain the story in more depth or to increase the complexity of the plot. I can identify contrasting points of view in a text. I know offering more than one point of view may limit the reader's sympathy or identification with the protagonist.</p> <p><i>Reasoning Targets</i></p> <p>I can identify the different points of view in a text I can contrast the points of view of the characters. I can explain the effects of the author developing the story through different points of view. I can explain how the contrasting points of view increase the complexity of the story, but may limit the reader's identification with (or sympathy for) a single protagonist.</p>
