How can an audience change the information used to support a claim?</p> <p>The reasons and evidence used to effectively support a claim in an argument may vary depending on the audience.</p> <p><u>Student Friendly Objectives</u></p> <p><i>Knowledge Targets</i></p> <p>I know the difference between persuasive writing and argument writing. I know the meaning of credible sources. I know rhetorical devices in writing arguments. Vertical Progression

W.K.1 - Use a combination of drawing, dictating, and writing to compose opinion pieces in which they tell a reader the topic or the name of the book they are writing about and state an opinion or preference about the topic or book (e.g., My favorite book is...).
