How does this help a writer publish a valid and credible written project?</p> <p>Writers must use accurate and credible sources to write research projects for a specific purpose or to answer a question. Academic honesty establishes the writer as a credible source to their audience.</p> <p><u>Student Friendly Objectives</u></p> <p><i>Knowledge Targets</i></p> <p>I know that there are many reasons why research may be used in writing. [Literature biography project](#) - Students will learn to develop the various processes used in researching and writing a biographical research paper, including brainstorming, note taking, outlining, creating a bibliography, and writing the final draft.

[Campaigning for fair use: Public service announcements on copyright awareness](#) - This multi-media unit introduces students to fair use and copyright rules. After evaluating their personal usage of text and media, students research actual laws using kid-friendly Internet sites that explain intellectual property rights.

[The history behind song lyrics](#) - In this lesson from ReadWriteThink, students research and categorize the people, places, and events referenced in the lyrics of Billy Joel's "We Didn't Start the Fire." They then illustrate the historical relevance of each and use an online.

[Let it grow: An inquiry-based organic gardening research project](#) - In this lesson from ReadWriteThink, students learn about organic gardening by developing their own research questions, conducting research, and gardening at their school. They then create signs about their plants and present their research to the class
