People use expository writing to identify and analyze problems, pose solutions, and document results. Children can write about many problem-solving situations in this group learning process. In the following example, children write about the loss of a gingerbread man. They advertised and through this process solved the problem. While this example is based on fiction, the problem-solving process involved several forms of expository writing. Children can identify problems, documenting them through interactive writing, identify possible solutions, test those solutions, and come to conclusions. They can write during the problem solving process as well as afterward.
