Ouestions to Focus Learning How do the text features in informational text help me locate and understand the facts? Text features found in informational text are tools that a reader can use to help them understand the text. Readers must consider all the parts of an informational text in order to gain a full understanding of the text. Student Friendly Objectives Knowledge Targets I know text features are used to find key facts and information. I know authors use text features to point out important ideas. I know headings are words or group of words used to break a page into sections and tell me what the section will be about. I know the table of contents is a list at the beginning of the book that tells the reader where to find things. It provides the reader with the titles of different sections of the book and the page number for each section. I know glossaries are lists of important words and their meanings, found at the back of a text. I know electronic menus guide the reader to specific topics within an electronic text. I know icons are pictures representing specific files or software applications. Reasoning Targets I can use text features to locate specific facts or information in text. I can explain how various text features help readers gain information from a text (e.g., headings help you understand what a section will be about).
